6. **Board of Public Works Committee Report:** Alderperson Hicks
Public Works Department Head Tim Via showed his hours worked excel spreadsheet for the park in kind matching grant work. We have a recording breaking snowstorm and it took many man hours to clear the city and keep it clean. Picking up the red and black City of Gillett garbage and recycling bins so we can sell them in bulk. GFL has distributed their bins. In our new 2026-2031 contract we need to use their bins, our hinges were breaking and they will not cover the repair costs anymore. East Cedar and Eschner there was a storm sewer collapse, PTS repaired the storm. The new zero-turn mower is delivered; it is for the cemetery. We dug out pickle ball cement court, due to cost it will be cheaper to relay the concrete compared to the fiberglass overlay we would have needed to build a good playing court.

11. **Police Department Report:** Police Chief Breitenbach
 - a. Discussion on Training, Public Relations, and Incident Summary Report -Chief Breitenbach
 Gillett Police Department \ 175 incidents \ March 2026
 I participated in a training event hosted by the League of Wisconsin Municipalities. The training revolved around pressing and evolving challenges facing Wisconsin's law enforcement agencies including police liability and the role of sound policy in managing risk. Other topics discussed included the rising settlement costs to the ever-changing legal landscape, the evolving landscape of police liability, Wisconsin's statutory policy requirements, and the practical steps administrators can take to protect their agencies.
 SRO Hull was able to utilize funds provided by an Opioid Remediation Grant to bring the inspirational speaker, Douglas Darby, to speak at several schools throughout the county. Douglas Darby is a survivor in long-term recovery who is committed to igniting the very spark in a person that will help change the world we live in. Douglas' mission is to bring different educational programs into mental health, substance use, connection and inspiring hope not only in youth but in all of us.
 SRO Hull has secured two new AED's for the school district buildings. SRO Hull also advised that the security curtains have been installed on all of the classroom doors.
 SRO Hull is working on bringing a peer support program, Sources of Strength, into our schools. The Sources of Strength peer support group is a peer-led mental wellness program that aims to prevent suicide and promote mental health in youth. It utilizes a relational connections model, where peer leaders are mentored by adult advisors to change peer social norms and encourage help-seeking behaviors. The program focuses on upstream, strength-based work to reduce the likelihood of suicidal behavior among high school students. It trains peer leaders to conduct messaging activities that reduce the acceptability of suicide and increase the acceptability of seeking help. The program is designed to be a multi-year project with ongoing peer messaging and contacts growing over time.
 As a reminder, on April 25, 2026, from 10am-2pm, the Gillett Police Department will be hosting the annual Spring Drug Takeback event. This event is a special nationwide drug take back event! Also, as a reminder we have a drug drop-off container located in the Gillett Police Department lobby that is available daily.
12. **Fire Department Report:** Fire Chief Hicks- March 12, lift assist EMS, 14th lift assist Gillett EMS, 16th Line down from storm, April 1st Gillett lift assist. We have 4 trucks and 4 captains, their responsible to go through each truck each month and equipment Very proud of these captains and the way they take care of the truck and equipment. They go through all the chain saws, generators, run

everything, and made sure we were prepared for the record breaking snowstorm and all the things that come with weather. Looking forward to summer. Within 5 years would like to trade in oldest main line pumper truck and purchase a used truck.
